The Pursuit and the Lament 2 Samuel 1:17-27 June 30, July 1, 2018 / Steve Fish

I. DESPERATE JEALOUSY

 Saul's reign as king was introduced with HUMILITY and yet a righteous ANGER for the sake of Israel. (1 Sam. 10:22; 11:6)



- God rejected Saul because of DISOBEDIENCE.
 (1 Sam.13:13-14; 15:10-11)
- Saul's jealousy was heightened by an EVIL SPIRIT sent by the Lord. (1 Sam. 16:14; 18:10-11)

II. THE PURSUIT

- David was first welcomed into Saul's house for two reasons: his ability to SOOTHE Saul's spirit, and his victory over GOLIATH. (1 Sam. 16:19-23; 17:57-58)
- THREE times David had to avoid being speared in Saul's court. (1 Sam. 18:10-11; 19:9-10)
- Saul tried to eliminate David by making him a COMMANDER so that he might be killed by the Philistines. (1 Sam. 18:12)
- Saul wanted David to marry his daughter in order to ENSNARE him so that he might be killed by the Philistines.
 (1 Sam. 18:17, 20-21)
- Saul extended to his attendants a LICENSE to KILL. He also sent a regiment to David's house with an order to kill him. (1 Sam. 19:1, 11-17)
- TWO times Saul promised not to do harm to David only to break his WORD. (1 Sam. 19:6; 26:21)
- Saul pursued David around a rock in the Desert of Maon, only to be interrupted by the news of a Philistine invasion.
 (1 Samuel 23:7-8; 26-29)
- TWO times Saul seemed to be DELIVERED into David's hands. Both times David refrained from initiating his own vengeance on Saul because he was the Lord's anointed one. (1 Sam. 24, 26)
- The pursuit came to an end when Saul DIED on Mount Gilboa.

III. THE LAMENT OF THE BOW (2 SAMUEL 1:17-27)

"How the mighty have fallen!"

NO MENTION of Saul's pursuit was made in DAVID'S lament.

- The ANGUISH of the lament was reserved for Israel. The CURSE of the lament was placed upon the battleground.

 v. 20-21 "Tell it not in Gath . . . "Mountains of Gilboa, may you have neither dew nor rain.
- Saul was CELEBRATED for his might in battle (and so was Jonathan).

v. 21b For there the shield of the mighty was despised, the shield of Saul—no longer rubbed with oil.
22 the bow of Jonathan did not turn back, the sword of Saul did not return unsatisfied.
23 Saul and Jonathan—in life they were loved and admired,

 By honoring Saul as the LORD'S ANOINTED, David strengthened the nation and the monarchy.
 (1 Sam. 24:6, 10; 26: 9,11,16, 23; 2 Sam. 1:14,16)

APPLICATION:

- Respect is EARNED. Honor is GIVEN.
- The danger of humility is LOSING it.
- HAPPINESS is at least secondary to God's will for us.
