6. Describe what Christ had done in making *you* a part of his chosen people.

I. GOD'S KINGDOM ESTABLISHED IN ISRAEL

From the time of Moses, Israel's priests led the people by inquiring of God for His will and direction. As a result of the pleas of Israel's people, the theocratic system was replaced by God working through a _____ ruler.

2 Sam. 22:47 "The Lord lives! Praise be to my Rock! Exalted be my God, the Rock, my Savior! ⁴⁸ He is the God who avenges me, who puts the nations under me, ⁴⁹ who sets me free from my enemies. You exalted me above my foes; from a violent man you rescued me. ⁵⁰ Therefore I will praise you, Lord, among the nations; I will sing the praises of your name.

II. GOD'S ETERNAL KINGDOM REVEALED THROUGH CHRIST

Matt. 4:17 From that time on Jesus began to preach, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is near."

- The foundation of inclusion into God's kingdom can be found in Ephesians 2:1-10:

- God has a great love for us. (Ephesians 2:4)
- God is rich in mercy. (Ephesians 2:4)
- God is rich in grace. (Ephesians 2:7)
- God has already seated you in the heavenly realms. (Ephesians 2:6)

Eph. 2:11 Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth...^{12b} at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world. ¹³ But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

Paul said the Ephesians had been:

- Separated from Christ

- _____ from citizenship with Israel
- Without hope and without God.

But now . . . you have been brought near through Christ's blood!

Eph. 2:14 For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, ¹⁵ by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, ¹⁶ and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. ¹⁷ He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. ¹⁸ For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

- Through His sacrificial death on the cross, Jesus _____ the requirements of the Jewish law. Neither Cornelius nor the first gentile converts were required to become Jews because the church leaders could see that God had already given them the Spirit (see Acts 10; Acts 15.)

- Through faith in Christ, people of every culture are invited to know God and be included within His heavenly kingdom.

III. THE SECURITY OF BEING A CITIZEN OF HEAVEN

Eph. 2:19 Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household, ²⁰ built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. ²¹ In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. ²² And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.
